"I try to encourage him in every way that I can. Whatever he ends up doing I just want him to enjoy it and be happy."

In spring and summer when there are no holidays, Petrowski has a small pond that he accessorizes behind the house. Petrowski says that he wants to be an actor, and according to his mother, he is well on his way.

"We took him to see "CATS" at the Oakdale," she said. "And he knew the whole script by heart."

But the decorator in Petrowski could not be suppressed, she said. Like at home, Petrowski spent much of the show critiquing the set design and contemplating modifications that he, with a roll of duct tape, some lights and a big imagination, could undoubtedly create.
